magine competing in the Olympic Games. It must be particularly stressful if your fame goes before you like Andy Murray or Usain Bolt. Imagine the pressure to fulfil the hopes and dreams of your fans and family; your every action and comment being analysed by the media as they compete for a winning scoop. You might consider hiding from the glare of publicity in order to allow time for mental and physical preparation. However, that would just stimulate rumours that you have sustained an injury or have been caught out by a drugs test. The most successful competitors are those who believe in their own ability to win and are eager to share it with the world. Imagine the reaction if Andy suggested that, as he didn't win at Wimbledon, he wasn't expecting to get far in the Olympic tennis either. Imagine the reaction if Usain reminded people that he messed up in 2008, so there was a good chance he would make another false start in 2012.

The origins of the ancient Olympic Games are not clear, but they were well established by the 5th century BC and were still held in Athens every four years (an Olympiad) when Jesus walked the earth. Although the Bible does not refer to the Olympic Games explicitly, Paul used their vocabulary in several of his letters. 1 Corinthians 10 v24 – 27 contains a powerful analogy between the discipline of an athlete and that of a Christian; Romans 8 v37 even refers to Nike, but not as sponsors! The Greek word 'nike' is now variously translated as 'overwhelming victory' or 'more than conquerors', but it was originally personified by the Greek goddess Nike, the goddess of victory. Her Roman equivalent was Victoria. Paul's message is as timeless as the Olympic Games themselves, and is as challenging to us as it was to his readers. Our aim should always be to win; yes, it involves personal commitment and sacrifice, but the heavenly reward is more valuable than any gold medal. Just imagine what it will be like when we cross the finish line and Jesus is there to greet us!

Trip to London to see the Flotilla.

Marion and Ted Pretty and I were lucky enough to be offered tickets on a coach to see the Thames Pageant on Sunday 3rd June. We set off in drizzling rain equipped with rainwear and scarves and brollies, wondering if we were quite mad. None of us had ever dared to brave

the crowds like this before. A really easy journey to Blackfriars Road and we were dropped off at the Bridge about 11 am with instructions on when and where to return and "Don't be late because I can't hang about!"



Toilet facilities were plenty on the Bridge and then we were down the steps and amazingly found a place at the embankment wall, only one line of people in front, who had been there since 7 am! The atmosphere was wonderful, full of excitement and pride in what our



country can produce on these occasions. People soon came behind us and we were surrounded mostly by younger people, who made us laugh and seemed to carry an enormous amount of food and drink with them. People in the building behind, which

sheltered us a bit from the wind and drizzle, gathered on the balcony wearing royal masks and playing music to which we all sang.

in London

The pub just 50 yards up the road did a roaring trade in coffee and tea as well as beer, and we were able to use their toilets if needed.

Across the water was a huge screen showing what was going on further down the river and another on Blackfriars Bridge to our right, and a wonderful view of St Paul's Cathedral.

The procession was due past us at about 2.30 pm with over a thousand boats, comprising rowing boats, working boats, pleasure

boats etc making a flotilla nearly seven miles long. We waved our flags, and cheered and 'oo-hed' and 'aahed' at the musical barges with their choirs and orchestras, and at the Dunkirk little ships, the biggest contingent, and the small blue and white



boats bearing the flags of the Commonwealth.

The Spirit of Chartwell carrying the Queen and decorated with thousands of blooms was led by the royal barge and when this



appeared our young friends poured out the champagne and we all sang 'God Save the Queen'.

One million people lined the banks of the river and we were there too!
