

magine you are a little girl deserted by your parents. You look around you and nothing seems familiar. You thought Mum went down that street - or maybe it was this street. You are desperate and confused. No help comes. We can all imagine this desperation and the events that might follow if there isn't a happy outcome. Imagine! This happens today, in Syria and other places. Don't we all have an inner dread of losing our bearings, of the familiar suddenly vanishing and being completely lost? Many of us have built a comfortable life for ourselves, our friends, our garden that we cherish and our weekly church service. Shouldn't we be careful how closely we cling to these things? Jesus said "If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters – yes even life itself – he cannot be my disciple".

These are tough words but isn't Jesus trying to protect us from holding on too tightly to things, even people? I always think Jesus had a bit of a sense of humour and some of his extreme sayings were to make a point by going 'over the top.' I am hoping there were wry smiles on the disciples faces! I heard a massive thunder clap outside my window just now. I felt suddenly afraid. Fear is never very far from us, is it? Viktor Frankl had, in fact, lost his whole family to the gas chambers when, as he was digging in a cold icy trench in the concentration camp he had these thoughts:

In a last violent protest against the hopelessness of imminent death, I sensed my spirit piercing through the enveloping gloom. I felt it transcend that hopeless, meaningless world, and from somewhere I heard a victorious 'Yes' in answer to my question of the existence of an ultimate purpose. At that moment a light was lit in a distant farmhouse, which stood on the horizon as if

painted there, in the midst of the miserable grey of a dawning morning in Bavaria: "and the light shineth in the darkness."

We all hope that Jesus is there to hold our hands as we walk through the valley of the shadow of death. As Janet watched her Mum walk that path and agonised over what her Mum was going through, all public services, hospice, nurse, doctors, had failed her. The sufferers were completely alone. At the moment of extreme crisis something unusual happened. At midnight Becky, one of Mum's neighbours, drove into the car park. Janet called her from the kitchen window. With Becky by her bedside, Mum calmed down. The family calmed down. At Mum's memorial we looked at a screen with a picture of footprints on a beach. We recalled the saying "At the times when there was only one set of footprints, that was when I was carrying you!" Don't cling too closely too earthly things but trust in the one who says "Lo, I am with you always".
