

magine being a very young and junior nurse coming to terms with nursing people with cancer.



Imagine this nurse, returning to work after Christmas, discovers that the young woman's cancer had not spread, her prognosis was good and the future looked good. Imagine the exuberant joy she and the young woman and her family must have felt! Was this how Mary felt when she knew she had been chosen by God to be the mother of the Saviour of the world; or how the shepherds felt when told of His birth?

For this nurse and young woman, this was when the power of prayer and the glory of Christ became real. So fitting then that this should happen at the time when we celebrate Christ's birth.



Operation Christmas Child

What a fantastic evening we had on 13th November - the hall was a hive of activity, with everyone including the children packing Shoe Boxes. At the end of the evening 185 boxes were filled with a large assortment of goodies that had been given by many generous people. Some items and boxes had been left anonymously in my porch; there were items from people who have been knitting hats, scarves and gloves throughout the year, including members of the ladies group at Bishops Stortford Methodist Church; two people from Water Lane URC, Bishops Stortford brought their collection and joined in the fun of packing; Stansted Tennis Club again donated tennis balls for every box; and Bentfield Primary School filled over 40 boxes. I am also very grateful for the donations of money given to help with the transport costs. By the time the boxes were dispatched the number had risen to over 330, including 70 from the Catholic Women's Meeting.

Once the boxes have been checked at the Harlow centre, they will be packed straight into a container ready to be dispatched to Belarus. Cuddly toys and other items too big to go in a shoe box, together with any baby clothes, are packed into boxes to go directly to children's homes, orphanages or hospitals. Early in the New Year an educational project is starting in Liberia so any excess pens, pencils and note pads will be kept to be sent there.

Nothing is thrown away!!

On behalf of all the children who receive the boxes and the Operation Christmas Child Team, I would like to say a very sincere thank you to everyone who contributed in anyway to make this year's appeal so successful.

A CELEBRATION DAY OF CHURCH MUSIC

On Saturday October 27th, Peter, Michelle, James, Abigail and I set off early in the morning to attend a celebration day of music held at the URC Church in Billericay. It was a nostalgic day for Peter and I as we were going back to the church where we were married.

The church has been renovated much the same as our own and it felt strange to me to look at the changes that have been made and I tried to visualise what it used to be like. The building is situated in Chapel Street and here we saw a vast change - not for the better however! Some buildings were still there but looked rather tatty and where there were once lovely gardens, cars were sitting on paved drives - a sign of the times! My own family home, the Old Manse, had long since been demolished to make way for a large car park for BT vans which were parked at the back of the Post Office not a sight I really wanted to see when I think of the home where I was brought up.

However, all was not doom and gloom for when we entered the Mayflower Hall, so named because five people from Billericay sailed on the Mayflower to a new life in America, hardly anything had changed. The people were friendly and welcoming and we sat down to coffee and biscuits before walking to the church for an opening service and a short talk about the history of Billericay URC. We then had a session of very lively singing presented by Simon, the Choirmaster at the church. It was good to hear and be part of a large congregation who sang with such enthusiasm! We sang both traditional and new music and it was truly uplifting.

In the second session we gathered into small groups and discussed any musical 'problems' that we found in our own church. It seemed to me that most churches have similar problems and it was interesting to hear the various ways in which each church was trying to address their own particular situation. Smaller congregations, varying styles of music used within services, lack of younger people were all mentioned, but we all came to the conclusion that we were in church to worship God and that our music, whether traditional or contemporary is a great aid to that worship and should continue to be treated as such.

I was pleased to report that Stansted Free Church is doing its very best to give music a place in its services, a place where we can worship God using the talents He has given us both instrumental and vocal. Our own worship group is proof of this and we should be thankful for the talent brought together from both churches represented in our congregation.



After more singing there was a tea provided in the Mayflower Hall and a closing service to end the day. It was an enjoyable experience but it must be said that if the Musicians' Guild is to continue to flourish, our own church should give their support and encouragement to keep the
