

magine living and sleeping on London's streets, the temperature below freezing and your clothes ineffective against wind and rain. Imagine Christmas, cold, hungry and alone, with all around you exchanging presents, enjoying family parties and over-eating. What a difference it would make to have a place to go where there is warm food, a hot shower and clothes - clean, warm clothes!

Whitechapel Mission was founded 130 years ago to care for London's poor and homeless in their struggle against hunger, poverty, disease, prejudice and exclusion. Today over 3,000 volunteers serve refreshments, collect and sort clothing and fund raise. What if those volunteers were not there? The Mission could not function, and the street people would have to look elsewhere for food and clean clothes.

We are not trying to stimulate you into giving more to Whitechapel Mission (we know you give generously already), but to reflect on the poverty that exists in every community including Stansted. Maybe not the material poverty experienced by the street people, but other forms of poverty are just as prevalent. Being housebound can be as depressing as being homeless. Loneliness can affect all of us even in a crowded town.

Surely an important part of our church's mission is to reach out with love to our neighbours, regardless of their race or religion. Thankfully that is already happening, but there is still much to do. Imagine what our church will be like in 130 years time and let's make that our target now!

David: Yes, new ideas and new gifts too. The church has so much to offer and so much to receive. In other words, getting on with the things that really matter.


Keith: Like God's love and that every human being is precious.

New directions in worship - 7th January 'Getting changed'

A new year's resolution is about changing some aspect of your life. We have now had the third of our morning services which endeavour to change an aspect of our worship. When we joined together as one church it gave us an unexpected opportunity to have both a morning and afternoon service on the first Sunday of each month. The morning service would be something different - inclusive of all age groups, more informal and would try out new ways of engaging together with God's message.



For example, you are likely to be given something to read or asked a question about a biblical character. Dotted around the church there are likely to be pictures related to the theme of the service, which, at some stage the children will collect from you and pin on a frieze at the front of the church... but all in a very comfortable setting. So comfortable that someone is likely to point out your shoelace is undone or rescue a ladybird! And all in a natural feeling way!

Our first 2007 service was called 'Getting Changed'. In a relaxed informal setting we discussed whether we had kept our new year's resolutions a week after making them. Was it even realistic that we should keep them? Jesus says you can't just change inconvenient parts of your life willy-nilly! When we try to change we can't see ourselves as God or others see us, so we don't always know how to change. We sought some clues from well known people who changed, looking at each in turn via the medium of pictures of key turning points in their stories:

The Wise Men changed. Change is sometimes unexpected. We must be prepared for this. The 'thing' that the wise men found was not what they expected at all. Change also involves being wise to those around us who would frustrate change. Herod wanted the status quo to remain and was prepared to enforce it ruthlessly.

Jonah met change with *anger*. He also found that change was frightening. Imagine the claustrophobia inside the whale! Ultimately change meant *obedience* to God. The dialogue between Rachel, Zacchaeus' wife and her neighbour brought home that change doesn't just affect ourselves. We need to be sensitive to others around us as we change.

With Peter, change involved a roller coaster ride of misunderstanding & insight, loyalty & betrayal, impulsive behaviour & thoughtful letter writing, fear & martyrdom... amazing polarities of experience! "Peter you will be taken where you don't want to be taken", Jesus told him.

Change is essential for our spiritual health. It can be a frightening experience. Like our four models we need to trust that we will stay safe and we need to obey. As our final hymn said "There's no other way".

Answers to last month's questions

If I had a white stone what would be written on it?
