Collection for Lebanese Evacuees

Church members very generously donated £250 to be spent on essentials for the Lebanese evacuees living in Stansted. All their furniture and clothing requirements have been met by kind gifts, but we have bought them cutlery and pots and pans. However, most of the money is being spent on transport, as they have to go to Braintree Job Centre regularly. Two of them have already obtained full employment and others have part-time jobs. Until they get full-time jobs they must attend Braintree, and at the moment this is weekly. They are most grateful that there are people willing to drive them most weeks and it is fortunate that we are able to reimburse the drivers. Those who attended the Remembrance Day service will have seen one of the Lebanese lay a wreath at the memorial. This was partly a gesture of thanks to all the people of Stansted, who have welcomed them into the community.

From the Secretary

As you will have read, our URC minister, David, is retiring in March. Contributions for a gift to me by 18th February please.

Our gift service on December 17th was different in that we had no electricity. Fortunately the heating had been on before the power went off so the church was warm, but of course there was no organ or electric piano. A quick change of some of the hymns, as one or two would have been difficult to sing unaccompanied; Fran dashed off to get her flute and Marion set up her keyboard which has battery back-up. Sadly the battery died after a couple of hymns, but Fran didn't run out of wind and kept us in tune. So what could have been a problem turned into a very good service. We did miss the coffee and mince pies though!

The year 2007 sees the 200th anniversary of the Abolition of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. We look back and wonder how people in the 1800's could have condoned slavery, and yet it still goes on today. In the local paper recently there was a report of someone being charged with illegally bringing children into the UK for immoral purposes. We may think that it isn't our problem but these children came into England at Stansted Airport; it can't get any closer than that. The paper also reported that a number of these children have now disappeared. We can't even begin to imagine what their lives must be like. Do we sit back like those in the 1800's or do we do something about it? There is an organisation called 'STOP THE TRAFFIK' which I ask you to consider supporting. I quote from their website:

STOP THE TRAFFIK is a global coalition of organisations working together to fight against people trafficking, by raising awareness on a subject that is little known or understood. STOP THE TRAFFIK will call for change and freedom. There are currently over 300 member organisations, including businesses, faith groups, community groups and charities....

The four key areas that STOP THE TRAFFIK is focused on are advocacy, education, fundraising and Freedom Day. Through advocacy and education, STOP THE TRAFFIK will demonstrate to the public ways in which they can get involved and help change people's futures. At the heart of the campaign is the Global Declaration Card. Thousands of cards signed by people worldwide will be delivered to the United Nations. These aim to pressurise the UN and individual governments to bring about a change in legislation and policies, resulting in protection from people trafficking.

The initiative will climax on March 25th 'Freedom Day' with local events worldwide
