magine being a teenager again - yes it's very hard isn't it??!! But if you can, just imagine being a teenage girl (sorry men!) on a night out with your friends, and you've told your parents not to pick you up because you have a lift home with your friends, so they have gone out for the evening too. Imagine you have a disagreement with the friend who drives the car; so you leave the disco alone. Panic sets in as you realise you have to walk to the bus stop or taxi rank wearing flimsy clothes and high heeled shoes; then disaster strikes when the heel breaks on one of your shoes.

Imagine being 'The Speaker'

Imagine being the innocent victim of a mugging; someone has taken some of your possessions, and in the struggle has pushed you to the ground and you need an ambulance. Imagine two people fighting outside a pub; one of them ends up needing emergency first aid and the landlord is so fed up with all the fights that go on outside his pub that he is no longer willing to help.

Now imagine someone handing you a pair of flip flops when your heel breaks, and offering to escort you to the bus stop or taxi rank; or someone offering to call for an ambulance and stay with you until it arrives; or offering to give you first aid on your injured hand. Imagine that person is someone you can trust, someone safe. That someone is a 'Street Pastor', and we have such people patrolling the streets of Bishop's Stortford on Friday nights, until around 2 am.

Street Pastors is an inter-denominational Church response to urban problems, engaging with people on the streets to care, listen and dialogue. It began in London in 2003 and has seen some remarkable results, including less crime in areas where teams have been working (including Bishop's Stortford). There are now over 100 teams around the United Kingdom. Each project is set up by Ascension Trust and run by a local co-ordinator with support from Ascension Trust and local churches (support is required from a minimum of four churches for each new project) and community groups, in partnership with Police, Council and other statutory agencies. As the Street Pastors get to know people in the community they find out what their needs are and what can be done to help. A presence of Street Pastors earns credibility in the community, so that people know that the Church is there for them in a practical way. The role is not about preaching heaven and hell, but one of listening, caring and helping - working in an unconditional way.

Street pastors are just 'ordinary' people who have received training to equip them for the many varied situations in which they may find themselves. 2020 Vision

At the July Church Meeting there will be a presentation entitled 2020 Vision, followed by a discussion. 2020 vision usually describes perfect eyesight; it is also the strapline of a newly launched consultation process from the United Reformed Church Mission Council asking each local congregation to respond to the challenge: 'What will the United Reformed Church be like in 10 Years?' It is part of the Vision for Life process, where we are offered to re-engage in turn with the Bible, Prayer and Evangelism.

All main Christian denominations for decades seem to have been in a state of simply trying to manage decline, yet at the same time there are stories of churches large and small where there are evident signs of growth. Ten years ago two small, remote chapels in the Brecon Beacons faced the fact that they were fast reaching the end of the line: small congregations, decaying and unsuitable property, and little money. One congregation decided that if they were to have a future they needed to get out of their building, so they booked the village hall, hoping to start a new outreach. The other chapel decided to join them. The venture did not take off as had been hoped, but the links with another struggling United Reformed Church grew, one with a run-down chapel in a good location and lots of potential. So, they soon joined. Today the chapel attracts a regular congregation of about 30, has been totally refurbished and is buzzing with life. Letting go of the burdens and treasuring the riches of the past has resulted in an active, thriving fellowship. The unions released energy, human resources and money. Visitors comment on how lively and uplifting the worship is. This is one rural chapel which is growing - and fast. This story seems to have many resonances with the way that Stansted Free Church came to be.

Within this consultation process about how the United Reformed Church as a whole is to move forward in the ten year period from 2010 to 2020, each local congregation is invited to make its own Local Mission Pledge and to send in this pledge to the Synod or the national church, and to review the pledge and either annually or bi-annually to assess how it is being fulfilled. One suggested pledge might be to increase the Sunday morning attendance by 10% and church membership by 5%; another might be to get involved in the climate change campaign. There can be more than one pledge running at a time. The advantage of making such a pledge is that it helps a church to clarify its priorities over a given time. This is the question: 'If this church was to make a 'pledge' about what it felt inspired to achieve in the next 12 months what would it be?' Come to the Church Meeting on July 14th and share your ideas. As they say in Pilots, 'All hands on deck!'

Ten Most Unique Churches No 2 Saint Basil's Cathedral: The Red Square 's Colourful Church



The St Basil's Cathedral is located on the Red Square in Moscow, Russia.

A Russian Orthodox church, the Cathedral sports a series of colourful bulbous domes that taper to a point, aptly named onion domes, that are part of Moscow 's Kremlin skyline.

The cathedral was commissioned by Ivan the Terrible to commemorate the capture of the Khanate of Kazan. In 1588 Tsar Fedor Ivanovich added a chapel on the eastern side above the grave of Basil Fool for Christ, a Russian Orthodox saint after whom the cathedral was popularly named.


