


Imagine!



Imagine living through an earthquake

“Imagine someone holding forth on biology whose only knowledge of the subject is the Book of British Birds, and you have a rough idea of what it feels like to read Richard Dawkins on theology”. A distinguished professor said that about ‘The God Delusion’ which glares at you from the buy-one-get-one-free stall at Waterstones. My friend bought one at Edinburgh Airport a couple of weeks ago and I know he can't wait to bait me with it. How daunted are we by atheistic attacks on our religion and are we armed to defend them? Many critics say there is not much substance to Dawkins' arguments and there is really nothing to fear. Some Christians actually welcome books like *The God Delusion* because they actually provide an opportunity to bring Christianity into public conversation. As Alister McGrath concludes, "Might the book actually backfire and end up persuading people that atheism is just as intolerant, doctrinaire and disagreeable as the worst that religion can offer?"

We live in a time when it is fair game to attack Christianity whilst virtually everyone takes great care not to attack Islam. Perhaps a more pernicious attack on Christianity comes from Phillip Pullman because he aims at a young and impressionable audience and rides on the success of the Harry Potter books. The children's trilogy ‘His Dark Materials’ has his heroine Eve pitted against an evil God and his evil Church. Children have always been fascinated by figures of darkness in these books of fantasy and I can feel the draw myself. But then I think of the evil wizards Stalin, Mao, Hitler and Pol Pot and the fascination fades. Although Dawkins may assert that religion is the root of war and dissent, dreadful crimes have been committed in the name of secular faiths. Let's be well armed to defend our faith wherever we can.

Induction of Rev Allen Morton

The interregnum is finished, the meetings of the vacancy committee are over and Allen Morton has been inducted into the pastorate as our URC minister. We are very pleased to have Allen and Daphne with us.. For those of you who didn't manage to get to the induction, it was a wonderful and happy occasion. There was a bit of a hiccup just before the service began as there was a power cut, which meant no organ, no electric piano, and no loud speaker system!! Fortunately our music group had been playing before the service and by using the battery on Marion's keyboard, were able to lead the service for the first hymn, albeit without any amplification. The moderator had announced that the clergy would have to remember their training and speak without the benefit of microphones, and we were told that the power would not be restored before 6pm! However just before the second hymn the lights flickered and power was restored, so all was well. It was a very moving service with many people taking part. Allen was welcomed by representatives of the local churches in Stortford and Stansted, as well as by the leader of East Herts DC, and Catherine Dean as Chair of Uttlesford DC. In true URC fashion there was a splendid tea in the hall afterwards.

As I write, the Induction service is still very fresh in my mind as a truly inspirational occasion. The Stansted Music Group certainly came into its own, particularly when the power failed twenty minutes before the service started, putting out of action both Water

Lane's organ and electric piano! Everyone was very grateful to the music group for ably rescuing the situation by accompanying the opening hymn, as well as by continuing the introductory playing before worship. Just before the second hymn was announced the lights came on again, the power was restored! We might say that a greater power was at work in that moment.

My friend Rev Ken Dunstan from Southminster preached on what a minister is for and how the people of God, the church, are together with the minister, to work for God's kingdom. Below is a summary of his message for those who may not have been able to be at the service, and to give others a chance to recall the essence of what he said.



The minister, said Ken, has to be a seer as much as a shepherd, needing to see the vision of the Kingdom of God, discerning what God is doing in the world, to tell about and invite the church into the exciting possibilities of what God is offering and asking. 'Receiving

the vision of God's kingdom, seeing what God is up to here and now, and joining in: there is an RSJ to support a ministry – receive, see, join!'

Turning the focus from what the minister is for, Ken went on to talk about the church's role in a ministry . Quoting the Epistle of Peter, he said: 'Above all, hold unfailing your love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins.' In that brief Ken included the minister, asking that the church look out for the minister as much as they would any other member of the church; the minister too is a part of the church. Like Jesus, ministers too need a leadership team, seeking support while wrestling with decisions. 'We are called to collaboration'.

In that call to hold one another in unfailing love, Ken included unity. Jesus prayed that we may all be one as he and the Father were one in heart and mind, the reason being, as Jesus himself prayed, that the world may believe that Jesus was sent from the Father. Love and unity must be upheld if our mission is to succeed.

Amen to that!
