# David Simpson This is your life at Stansted 1999-2007

In early 1999 we had been without a stipendiary minister after the Revd Margaret Mackay had left in April 1998, although we were in the fortunate position to have Revd Lydia Rapkin as our non-stipendiary minister. At that time Stansted was part of a group comprising Stansted, Newport and Clavering URCs; we were also in a linked pastorate with Saffron Walden URC.

As is the URC practice, the Moderators' Meeting put forward the name of a person who they think is suitable for the vacancy. The Moderator recommended that we considered a non-stipendiary minister who was in his final year at Westminster College, Cambridge, prior to entering full time ministry. So the cv of David Simpson arrived. This was no ordinary man; he'd had quite an exotic past! Having been brought up in a small Scottish fishing village, he started his working life in the local mine. After he and Sylvia married they began their travels, living in Liberia, Sierra Leone, Iran and the Oman before returning to the UK, where David worked in the pharmaceutical industry while serving as a non-stipendiary minister and prison chaplain.

The church decided that we must meet this man and on a cold winter's morning, the Elders from the Stansted Group and Saffron Walden met David in the church at Newport. The church had instructed us to ask David's opinion on various things but the most important thing we had to discover was 'can we understand his Scottish accent?' We had been acquainted with a Scottish minister in the past who had a very broad accent which we had found difficult to understand. Well David passed the test and we recommended to the Church Meeting that David be 'asked to preach with a view to becoming our minister'. This is another URC/Congregational custom.

So on April 11<sup>th</sup> 1999 David 'preached with a view' and the rest is history. We have enjoyed nearly 8 years of his ministry. He has

led us on our spiritual journey, seen us through the setting up first of the LEP in Clavering and now our joining together here in Stansted. In 2003 the URC was re-organised and sadly the Stansted Group disbanded; Newport and Clavering were to link with Saffron Walden, and Stansted with Bishops Stortford. We were then in the difficult position of interviewing our own minister for the job which he was already doing!

We thank God that David was called to us. We cannot thank David enough for his devotion to his 'flock', his tireless visiting, wise advice, his friendship to all, and of course we cannot fail to thank Sylvia for her support. We will miss them, but we have so many happy memories.



How often have we had the phone call "Can you read tomorrow, it's Sam 6 v 1-7?" "Which book of Samuel?" we ask. Then the exasperated reply "I mean Psalm"! Sometimes the accent did catch us out.

The Music Group were delighted when David could join them, such as during our Inaugural Celebration Service on 5th November.

Will we forget the Whit Sunday

when the helium balloon, which represented the Holy Spirit, slipped its moorings and floated around the church for several weeks? Or the Sunday when he left the service and over the sound system we heard his footsteps, the car being opened, some rummaging around and then more footsteps as he returned with whatever he'd forgotten. Happy days.

But things move on. David and Sylvia deserve a rest, more time to spend with their family and more time with each other. We wish them well.

# Christmas is a time of giving

I have just received a report from Samaritan's Purse on the 2006 shoe box appeal. A staggering 1.24 million boxes were sent from the United Kingdom to 12 countries in Eastern Europe and Africa. Our 260 odd boxes seems very small in the big scheme, but they are important and thank you to everyone who helped in any way.

The boxes from the Harlow distribution centre were sent to Romania and in a the village of Sigheto Marmatiecin, Northern Romania, six year old Mehi can now start school thanks to his box, as gypsy children are not allowed to go to school until they can provide their own pens, pencils and note pads. "I have been given the best box in the village" he said. His mother collected the empty cardboard carton that the shoe boxes were packed in to use as a rug in the family's small wooden home that they shared with 16 other people.

As you go round the shops in the next few months watch out for bargain items suitable for the boxes for this year and if you want to do something, start knitting hats, gloves and scarves etc - it all helps when November comes.
