My Australian Christmas Services

I was able to attend a church in Australia on four Sundays during my recent trip, accompanied by Katie my 4½ year old granddaughter, which was an added joy. Joanna had previously been to the Anglican Church at Leichhardt a district in Sydney near to where they are living. The church was built in the 1850's and looked so much like many of our English churches, with its stained glass windows, memorial stones and of course the dark wooden old-fashioned pews, that I felt immediately at home. The congregation, numbering around 60, spread themselves all over the church and included many small children as well as adults, and nobody cared if the children made a noise or wandered about.

Katie dressed herself for the first occasion in her pink fairy dress and sparkly tiara and everyone thought that was really nice! I had secretly been rather horrified - a stranger in the church coming in with a fairy - though she did manage to leave the wand in the car. We were greeted with open arms; loaded with bibles and service sheets and I gazed around me at the wonderful Christmas decorations which were all sparkly - no fresh flowers as they wouldn't last. The preacher, Darren Hindle, young and full of enthusiasm is fairly new there, returning to Sydney after living in Hong Kong and latterly Singapore, being originally from Canada. As he only looked about 30 years old I wondered how he had fitted all that in. The leader of the church, Osea Taito, was also fairly new to the church, coming from one of the Pacific Islands, and was large as the other was slight.

He welcomed the congregation that first Sunday by beaming around and saying 'G'day folks, welcome to our Service' and so I knew for sure I was in Australia; then we all sang 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing'. They have a very nice choir who did a choral item and the children went out the front (including Katie) to play instruments and sing a special song. She made me go with her that first time, so there I was crouched in front of a lot of strangers with a triangle singing 'Our God is a great big God'!!

Then they went off for their special programme run by the minister's wife who has three young boys, and I returned hastily to my seat!!

All the words for the hymns are up on the large screen so we didn't have hymn books and there was also a small collection of guitarists and a drummer who accompanied the organ - just like being in Stansted - well almost! The order of the service was very much like ours and during the general prayers it was quite a surprise to have Osea pray 'for our wonderful Queen Elizabeth and her family'. After each service we went to the hall where coffee and homemade biscuits and cakes were served and it was so good to talk to the members of the church; and of course to hear about their relatives or ancestors who lived here and of their trips to Europe which they love to tell you about. I think they all said how much they loved it and one said she would prefer to be in England than Australia despite the weather.

This picture was taken on Christmas Eve at the family Carol Service, when the church was absolutely packed. We also went to a



big open air service 'Carols under the Bridge' (yes, Sydney Bridge) where people took picnics and there was ice-cream and face painting for the children plus a jazz band to warm things up. We sang as the skies darkened

and the lights of the harbour came on and the little ferry boats passed by; it was a wonderful experience, and I feel very lucky to have been able to go and share this time with my family.
