

magine a whole congregation emerging from church with dirty hair! That's how it used to be in the early days when you underwent the 'Ash Wednesday experience'. Apparently women were lucky as they only had the sign of the cross marked with ash on their brows. Men had to undergo the whole ash dowsing! Although 'Ash Wednesday' is not mentioned in the Bible the custom goes back to the eighth century at least. The earliest mention of it in England was in the writings of the Anglo-Saxon abbot Aelfric. The Bible does however mention sackcloth and ashes many times with the most recent of them being Jesus's comment about the likely reaction of Tyre and Sidon to his miracles if they had seen them performed ahead of Korazin and Bethsaida! Sackcloth and ashes appear all over the Old Testament. Tamar reacts to her rape with sackcloth and ashes; Mordecai takes them on when faced with the royal edict of destruction of the Jewish nation. It is interesting to see their use connected with acts of injustice such as the attack on Tamar and the oppression of a minority in Esther ch 4.

But of course, primarily sackcloth and ashes are connected with repentance. Having converted to Christianity, T. S. Eliot penned his famous poem *Ash Wednesday* with the lines "Because I do not hope to turn again" reminding us of the ease with which we can slip back into our old ways before repentance. Eliot hopes that once having turned away from his sinful nature, he does not fail and turn back again. It reminds us of Jesus's words "No one, having put his hand to the plough, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God." As we enter Lent let us remember the one who, well aware of our weakness, took our sins upon himself. Lent is a time of remembering that 'Love Divine' which we summon to come down, and which is so wonderful and inviting that we willingly let "earthly passions turn into dust and ashes in its heat consuming".

## Mission Shaped Intro

New world, new church? Our world and our lives have changed radically in the last twenty years, but has the church adapted to this change? Do we need a changed church for a changing world? Are new forms of church really possible? If so, how can they be developed? *Mission shaped intro* explores the 'why' of creating fresh expressions of church rather than the 'how'. The six-week course takes you on a journey looking at the ever-changing nature of our social communities and explores why the church needs to rethink its approach to those communities in meaningful and relevant ways. The sessions are delivered through presentation, movie clips and stories with active group participation. The course is part of Fresh Expressions, which encourages and resources new ways of being church. This six-week course is not designed to give clear cut answers or to arrive at any definite outcomes but rather to draw a response from participants that will lead to action on their part. The Fresh Expressions ethos is not to have all the answers and to learn from what God is doing around us and join in with Him. The format of the 6th session (Where do we go from here?) is still to be decided.

The sessions will be held in our hall on the following Wednesdays from 7.45 - 9.45 pm, led jointly by Revs David Keeble and Paul Wilkin:

# 2 pm Friday 2nd March Stansted Free Church Speaker Christine Heyhoe

On Friday 2nd March over 3 million people world-wide will be praying and worshipping together using a form of service prepared by Christian women in Malaysia, beginning in Tonga and continuing around the world until the final service takes place 35 hours later in neighbouring Western Samoa. By then the day will have been celebrated in over 170 countries and more than 6,000 services will have been held in the British Isles alone.

Malaysia is a multi-ethnic and multi-religious country, which has attracted migrants from other parts of Asia and beyond and is now one of the wealthiest and most developed countries in South East Asia. Women have made important contributions to its social and economic development but still face discrimination and violence at all levels of society. Even today a girl is seen as less valuable than a boy. Malaysia is now the most popular destination in Asia for migrant workers, and human trafficking has become a sophisticated and organised operation. Although Malaysia's multi-ethnicity has added to the rich heritage of its land and people, it has also given rise to many problems. In the service, those issues of concern are voiced. Justice for all is their hope, and their prayer is "Let Justice Prevail".

Although organised and led by women, this is essentially a day of prayer for everybody, as we demonstrate our solidarity with our sisters and brothers in other countries; all are welcome to attend. Further information can be found on the WWDP website at www.wwdp-natcomm.org.
