From the Church Oversight Group

What is it?

Some of you may be wondering what the Church Oversight Group is. Well, it comprises the six deacons, the joint treasurers, the secretary and the ministers. At the present time, the secretary and one of the treasurers also happen to be deacons, but this will not necessarily be the case in the future. We meet every four to six weeks to discuss any issues concerning the running of the church, finance, pastoral concerns, etc. If any major decisions need to be made, the Oversight Group will normally discuss them and then bring a proposal to the Church Meeting. The deacons represent the church members, and are elected at the Annual Church Meeting.

Where next?

When our constitution was drawn up, it was agreed that we would have two ministers - one Methodist and one United Reformed (URC). The appointment processes for ministers within these two traditions are different. Methodist ministers are appointed to a church for a fixed term, which can be extended, whereas URC ministers are appointed for an indefinite term. Following David's retirement, we are now beginning the process of seeking a new URC minister. We have already drawn up a 'profile' which tells a prospective minister where the church is on its 'spiritual journey', what our hopes and aspirations are for the future, and any particular qualities we would prefer a minister to have. In our case, the minister is shared with Bishop's Stortford URC, so we have to ensure that our two profiles are not wildly different; fortunately, they are not!

Once our two profiles have been approved by the 'higher authorities', they are sent to all URC ministers, who are then entitled to express an interest. At this point, their current congregations are usually unaware that their minister is thinking of moving; so we have appointed a vacancy committee to ensure that everything is kept confidential. It can be anything from six months to two years before a new minister is appointed, because all parties want to ensure that the 'right person' is appointed. For more about the process please see the Secretary's report on page 6.

Ministerial Support

During the interregnum, we have a URC interim moderator - who 'moderates' our church meetings, and leads some services - and we are delighted that Rev Janet Tollington has been appointed to us in this role. In addition, Rev Stuart Veitch, a supernumerary Methodist minister, who is a member of our congregation, will be assisting Keith Page with some aspects of pastoral ministry.

From the Secretary

At the special Church Meeting on Easter Sunday our representatives to the Joint Vacancy Committee were agreed as: Catherine Dean, Mike Dyer, Janet Townsend, Valerie Trundle and myself, with Marion Dyer as reserve. Our Draft Pastorate Profile was available after the service for anyone to read and make comments - all of which were favourable.

The Vacancy Committee meet on 1st & 22nd May, to compile a joint profile with Water Lane that will be sent to the Moderator ready for when the vacancy is declared at the June Synod. Once that has happened we sit back and wait patiently until the name of a prospective minister is put forward. Watch this space, but it may be some time. Until we have a name to bring to Church Meeting all discussions of the Vacancy Committee are confidential.

Christians and politics

On the occasion of local elections many of us may be asking questions such as:


- What is our Christian duty with regard to the State?
- Should Christians be 'good citizens'?
- Should the Church get involved in politics?
- Is it our duty to vote in elections, and should we make sure we are as informed as possible, so that we can vote responsibly?

Jesus told us to pray: 'Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. This surely implies that every Christian has a duty to make every effort to bring about God's kingdom here

on earth; indeed, many go into politics for this reason. We should work to make God the ruler of every situation. Making an informed vote may therefore be part of our Christian duty. As a result of becoming informed, we may find ourselves in a position to become more actively involved in discussion, or protest, or in the media.



A helpful reference might be 1 Corinthians 12.4-31 (on the diversity of gifts). Some of us may indeed have gifts that equip us for a very active involvement in politics. Others may have gifts in other directions, which are just as important for building up the Kingdom of God on earth. We desperately need Christian people working among the poor, in social work, in business and in other unsavoury parts of our society. Whatever our gifts, we can pray for discernment; that if our political life seems to be in good hands, with many Christians at work there, we might look elsewhere, but that if we discern disturbing trends in politics, we may feel called to offer ourselves and our talents to God in that work.



We ask you to remember our church family in your prayers: It's lovely to have Mary Ecclestone back at church again - we're all glad to see you Mary. Unfortunately Dora, Ivor and Mary Heuch aren't able to get to church as often as they, and we, would like, so to them and anyone else who is not able to get out and about we do miss you and wish you well.

Although this shows that we currently have a £4000 excess of income over expenditure, we do have some large expenses to come during the remainder of this year; the removal of the asbestos from the organ (£2000) and the replacement carpet in the hall (£3000). Our overall prediction for this year is that we will have deficit of around £4000.

The editors had not heard of Lord Howe Island either so we thought readers would be interested in a bit more of its history.....

On 17 February 1788 the convict ship HMS Supply was on its way

from Botany Bay when it chanced upon a little island paradise in the Tasman Sea. The ancient civilisations of the South Pacific didn't seem to know it. There was no sign of man ever having been there. Remaining just a navy statistic for some time, the island acquired the name of the first sea Lord. Ever

since the first population arrived fifty years later there have been fears for the precious species on the island. Amid the palm trees, mysterious glowing mushrooms can be picked. As the gentle breeze rustles the palm fronds, you might see on the bush tracks, covered with the fallen fronds, the rare Lord Howe Woodhen or the Lord Howe Currawong. Today the island is a World Heritage site.
