

magine that you are a Bangladeshi. You have no electricity in your home. You walk everywhere, though if you have to travel a long distance and you can afford it, you may take a bus. The idea of going in an aeroplane is as remote as going to the moon. You grow your own food or buy it at the local market. None of it is shrink-wrapped.

So your carbon footprint is very tiny. But, because of global warming, the floods are getting worse every year. People are already leaving the coastal areas and migrating to the cities to live in slums.

Imagine you are Chinese. You aspire to owning a car, which is much more comfortable than riding a bike and wearing a mask so you don't breathe in the polluted air. You know that nearly everybody in the western world has a car, and some households even have two. And if you get that promotion at work you may be able to afford to visit your sister 500 miles away, where they've just built a new airport. So your carbon footprint is growing as your wealth increases.

Imagine you are a member of Stansted Free Church. Your carbon footprint is about average for this country, but more than twelve times bigger than the Bangladeshi's and five times bigger than your Chinese cousin's. You know about climate change and your contribution to it. Because you are a Christian, you have a strong sense of your responsibility to save the planet. You have the knowledge and the ability to cut your personal carbon emissions. You can lead by example. I can help you calculate your carbon footprint and suggest ways to reduce it (and your carbon emissions). You can act - now!

Amy McGregor is now performing in local school productions, using her talents of singing, dancing and drama.


We are looking forward to a visit from them at our special Pilot evening.



"How I like to be looked after" by the Cat!


