

magine you are a Roman soldier shipped in to Jerusalem like thousands of others to cover the festival of Passover. Millions of Jews from all over the world descend on the city and it is a major issue for the authorities. Here you are, given one of the worst jobs overseeing a crucifixion, and a political one at that. The high-ups are nervous about this one; he has followers and there was conflict between him and the priests, and that is never good news. The execution will be visited no doubt by some of the religious leaders, to see you have done your job properly and to jeer at their enemy.

However it has been pretty quiet; you have nailed him up so the riskiest stage is over, and now it is just a matter of waiting. You toss for his cloak - you win. What the hell will you do with it? You drink; that's expected, and you wait. The prisoner looks at you and says "Father forgive them, they don't know what they are doing". What rot - you certainly do; done millions of them. You have to finish them all off, go back to Barracks, and sleep it off. You wake and notice the cloak, pick it up, and then it hits you. You have crucified an innocent man - maybe worse than that. You have a breakdown, get sent home, struggle for months, then come across that *** cloak again. You rush to pick it up to tear it to shreds, and stop. Incredibly, you feel forgiven. Peace. You are not to blame!! Peace like you have never felt before.

Such might have been the impact on a Roman soldier. The impact on the disciples is even more remarkable; silly, stupid, gutless men turned into bold, authoritative apostles by one act of God.

Can we experience for ourselves the incredible events of Easter? We ought to give it a go, for it does seem to completely change peoples' hearts and lives.

ANOTHER CENTENARY - BUT NOT ONE TO CELEBRATE

On 24th March 1916, my grandfather Private Harry Trigg of The Essex Regiment was killed in France aged 32, and his grave is in the British Military Cemetery in the village of Vermelles in Northern France. As I did not know the whereabouts of his grave, I rang the War Graves Commission and within a couple of minutes they told me exactly where his grave was situated and how to find the cemetery. I decided that the next time we were in France we would visit the grave, as apparently nobody in our family had ever seen it. However, we still did not get round to it until a few years later when we decided more or less on the spur of the moment to go. We booked the ferry and a room at the Campanile Hotel at Lens in northern France.

On arrival at the cemetery we followed the directions we had been given and



there in the right-hand corner close to the road in plot 2, row C, grave No 17, was the headstone engraved with the words: 16852 Private Harry Trigg, Essex Regiment, 24th March 1916. I cannot describe the feeling when I read my family name on a headstone in a foreign country, and as I stood looking at my grandfather's grave, it was all the more poignant for me as my father's name was also Harry. I then recalled the words of Rupert Brooke: "If I should die think only this of me, there is a corner of some foreign field that is forever England."

There are 2123 graves in this cemetery of young British soldiers, some as young as 18, very few older than early 30s. "They will grow not old, At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them." There were also a few German graves. My grandfather's name is on the war memorial in Manuden churchyard together with that of his younger brother Sergeant Leonard Trigg of the Bedfordshire Regiment, who was killed just 3 months later on 4th June 1916 aged 30. He has no known grave, although his name is on the memorial in the British cemetery in Arras. My Great Grandparents, William and Ellen Trigg of Manuden had seven sons, all of whom served in one or other of the armed services: Royal Engineers, Bedfordshire Regiment, Essex Regiment, Royal Navy, and Cameron Highlanders. Of the seven, Arthur, Harry and Leonard never returned.
