

magine if the Bible were a mixture of truths and other things that followed an agenda of a particular scribe. How would we sort out the wheat from the chaff? How would we spot the things that had not actually happened but were there to illustrate a point that a writer wanted to get across? At the U3A philosophy group, our subject was the story of Abraham and Isaac. Two of our members didn't think it actually happened but was a story to present a particular point of view, i.e. the writer knew that Abraham was a man of great faith and suggested a dilemma that would put the patriarch on the spot. It's the dilemma of choosing: either follow God's instruction or alternatively act morally (don't kill Isaac).

I am reminded of a Socrates dialogue in which the concern raised is whether morality is right because God loves it, or whether we follow morality because we love God; and what happens if we face a conflict between our inclination to act morally and our obedience to God? That's an issue I will leave you to ponder. But what about the other issue? Are there things in the Bible that perhaps reflect a situation in times past which are irrelevant today; and other things representing the point of view of a particular writer? C H Dodd's exposition in *Parables of the Kingdom* tries to show that parts of the gospels actually reflect how the early church saw its situation and that words were put in the mouth of Jesus that he didn't actually say.

That's quite a dilemma isn't it? How do you handle this kind of thing? I guess we have to look to what we believe about the fundamental nature of God and Jesus, and maybe test the importance or otherwise of the Biblical text in the light of those fundamental things: grace, love, awe, care for the dispossessed, critique of the pomposity of religion to name but a few. Over to you - what do you think?
