

magine you are considering the state of your faith. Richard Harries' most recent book *Haunted by Christ* has led me to two Welsh poets from the last century, both named Thomas, who have left me pondering the present state of religious faith. I have also been prompted into this reflection by an article in the Guardian by Simon Jenkins, where he observes how our cathedrals are bucking the trend of declining church attendance. He thought it has something to do with cathedrals providing a quiet space where anyone can go, and within the beauty of both building and music, they can pursue their own spiritual quest.

So what about our two poets? Edward Thomas was a non-believer, whose experience of chapel services and Sunday school in late 19th century Wales had driven him away from holding the faith that had been shared with him, because he found it too bleak and dogmatic. His poetry has a wistful longing within it for something lost. His most well-known poem *Adlestrop* is a wistful remembrance of an unscheduled stop at a remote village railway station in Gloucestershire, conjuring up pictures of the scenery, trees, plants and haycocks, alongside the song of a blackbird and the fainter calls of other birds. I wonder how many people similarly remember religious faith as something half-recalled from the past.

R S Thomas was a Church in Wales priest who practised his faith and yet his poetry often expresses the illusiveness of our experience of God. In *The Bright Field*, he likens our religious experience to the flash of sunlight on a field, there for a moment and then gone. *The Blackbird* describes how he hears in the bird's song a note of joy, love and grief. In *The Empty Church*, he likens kneeling in prayer to throwing thoughts at a stone heart, hoping they will ignite and throw "the shadow of someone greater than I can understand".

I wonder for how many people their experience of God seems just as fleeting and illusive? At the end of the month, we shall be entering Lent, a spiritual season when, among other things, we recall Jesus' time in the wilderness. Maybe Edward Thomas and R S Thomas allow us to ponder our own spiritual wildernesses, where we can pursue our spiritual quest.
