

magine travelling in a Russian train for 30 hours, changing, and travelling for another 30 hours to get home. That was the prospect for two Russian Methodists, Violetta and Galina that Brenda and I met on the last day of the European Methodist Festival held in Bratislava in August. Flying was far too expensive. Even their rail tickets were bought for them by some Irish Methodists. That's how keen they were to meet other Methodists, to celebrate the work and love of God together, and incidentally, to witness their dedication. Theirs is a tiny denomination where the next Methodist Church may be hundreds of miles away, but they emanated an air of confidence that put the rest of us to shame.

The theme of the festival was celebrating being young, being foreign, being different and travelling. Not difficult to appreciate all these topics at a festival of over 1000 people, a good proportion of young people, representing 25 nations speaking at least 10 languages, taking place in a country that was behind the Iron Curtain not so long ago. To a degree all of us felt ourselves to be foreign.

Quite right too! All of us, everywhere, should always feel foreign on this earth. Look up Hebrews 11: 13 and you will see that there is good scriptural basis for this assertion. For Paul is saying that the God fearer, the Christian, should never feel fully comfortable here, for whilst the earth is a gift from God, it is only a means to an end, a preparation for a fulfilment that comes in a later stage of our journey. Only when we are willing to put God absolutely first in our lives, thus putting everything else even including "church", subordinate to Him, will we be foreigners here on earth.

Imagine a Christian people so committed.

The Fields are ripe unto Harvest ...

Although this is traditionally harvest time, thank goodness many farmers finished their combining weeks ago before the onslaught of cold rainy weather! How many harvests were spoiled this year? In Gloucestershire for example and obviously in Bangladesh. "The fields are ripe unto harvest" says the Lord and in relation to our own lives, are the fields which should be ready for harvest also beaten down by the hard rains of life, by the tedious daily slog, by the slow drip of secular values and assumptions?

The dust cover of the little book "Everyday Prayer" talks of a belief that Christians are formed by the way they pray. Could that be likened to the gradual ripening of the corn of our lives that culminates in the full wheat ear of spiritual maturity so that ultimately we are ready to be brought into His barn? Ruth Tealby, the author of this book describes her own experience of a dissonance between the world of the altar and the daily grind of a pile of mail to be answered, phone calls anxiously waited, the need to pack children off to school and so on. I am sure you can add a few from your own experience; standing in an NHS queue for example or stuck in a carriage between Broxbourne and Cheshunt, times when the little niggling things of life as well as a latent brutality challenge the equanimity of our mood.

We probably feel like Ruth that we are not good enough for prayer. Yet it is in the knocks and jostles of life, in disappointment, failure and the sheer stupidity that the growth of the corn is slowly matured. As we offer the deadness, the doubt and drudgery of life in prayer we allow Christ to share our pain and inadequacy. Prayer is exactly for that. We don't need to be pure before we do it. Maybe as a result the corn can face the bitter winds and the wild rains and ultimately come through to become a beautiful field ready for harvest.

On behalf of Pump Aid, I write to extend sincere thanks for your recent donation, raised from your monthly Sunday Afternoon Outreach Teas. It really is very kind of you all to donate to Pump Aid. It will help us install a much-needed pump in Zimbabwe, which will have such a life changing impact on the lives of hundreds of children and adults.

To give you an idea, typically we will install an Elephant Pump at a poor rural school, along with improvements to their sanitation facilities, and establish a nutrition garden. We train the staff, children and local community on how to maintain the pumps and on related areas such as agriculture, health and hygiene. We then build pumps in four or five villages around the school so that children can have clean water at school and at home.

With all who will benefit from your donation, I send heartfelt thanks and blessings.
